


Eagle eyes

Have you ever been told you have eagle eyes? If so, that is a compliment. Eagles can see much better than humans. They have to be able to spot a fish or a small animal from hundreds of feet in the air.

On eagle's wings

- ★ A bald eagle can reach a speed of up to 75 + 75 + 50 = miles per hour when diving for a meal.



A bald eagle's long, broad wings make them good at soaring through the air. On long flights, eagles rarely flap their wings. Instead, they use thermal updrafts. Thermal updrafts are currents of warm air that rise up from the ground. Eagles save energy by flying high in a thermal updraft and then gliding down to catch the next one.

The bald eagle can be found on the Great Seal of the United States, on the country's money and in many images of patriotism. This week, look around you and see how many times you see pictures of a bald eagle.




Curve balls start when a pitcher throws them with **topspin**.


As the ball spins, its bottom surface moves in air flow the same direction in which the air moves. (THE REAL OF THE


Topspin makes the top of the baseball spin in the opposite direction to the air moving over the ball's surface, creating **wind resistance**.



Wind resistance creates higher **air pressure** above the ball which pushes against the ball, making it fly in a curved flight path.
