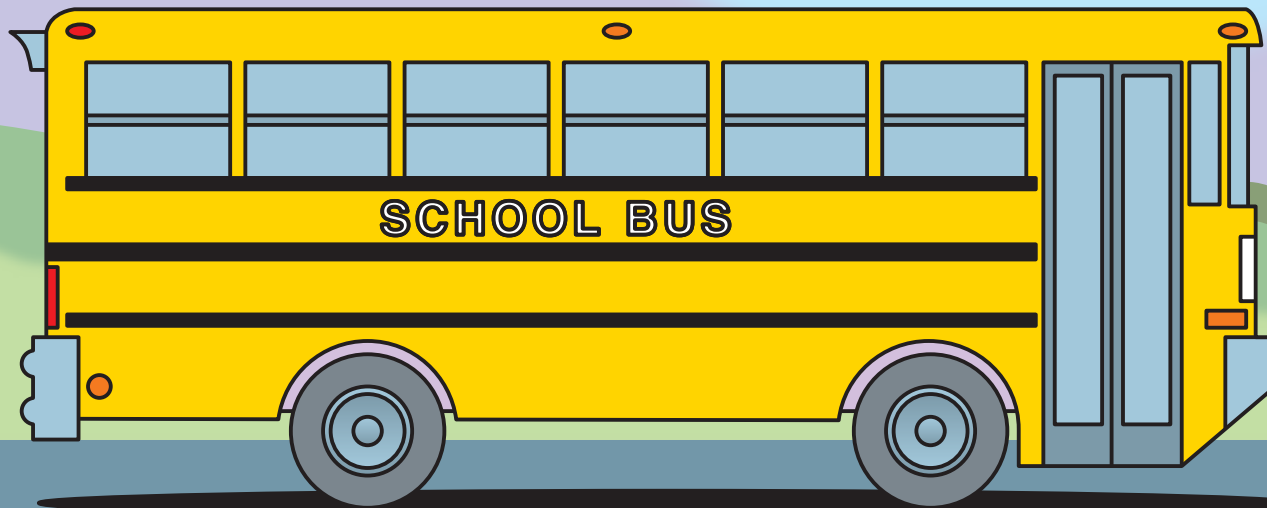

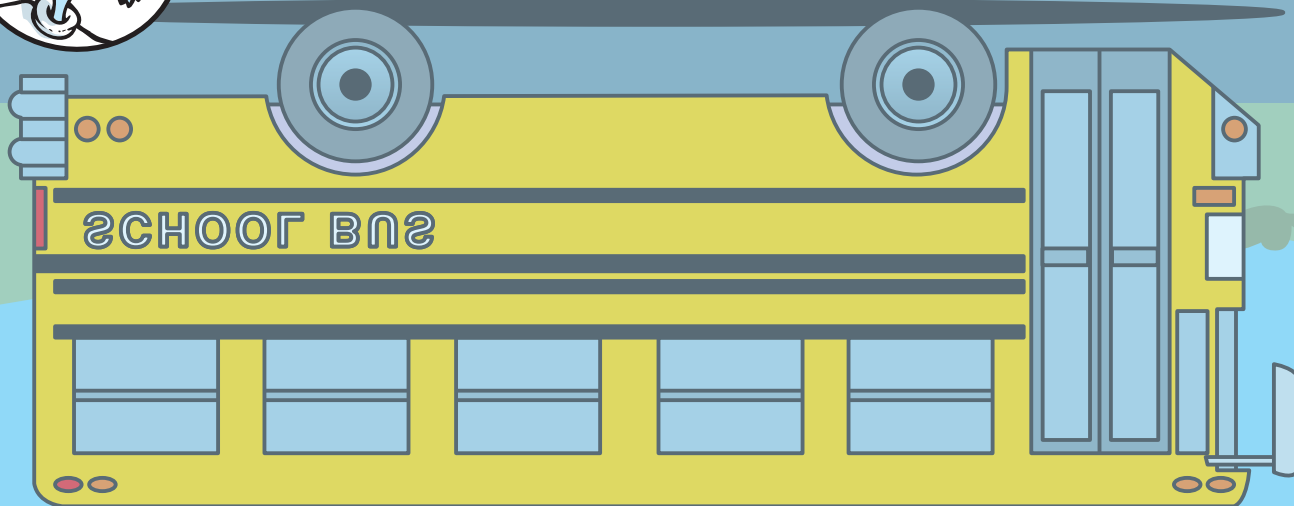

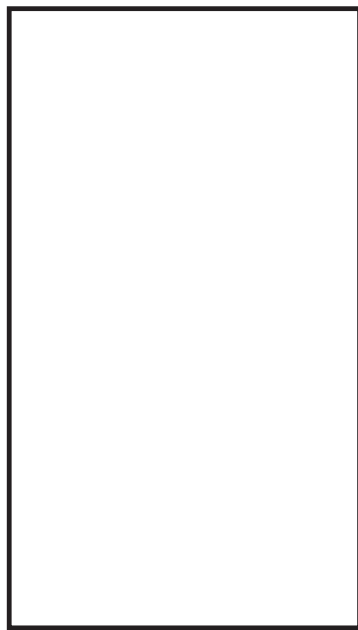
This month, think about the freedoms you enjoy because of the U.S. Constitution! Talk about it with your family and friends. It is something to be proud about!

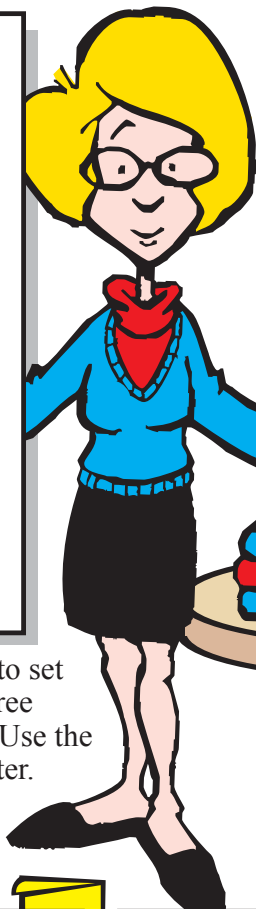

The First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States guarantees freedom of speech.



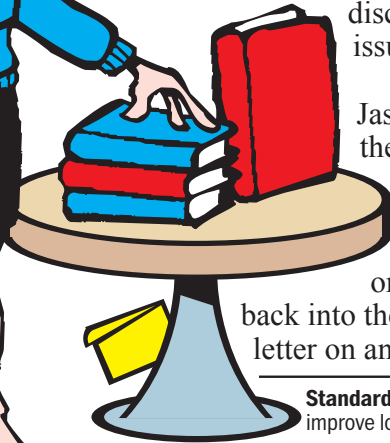

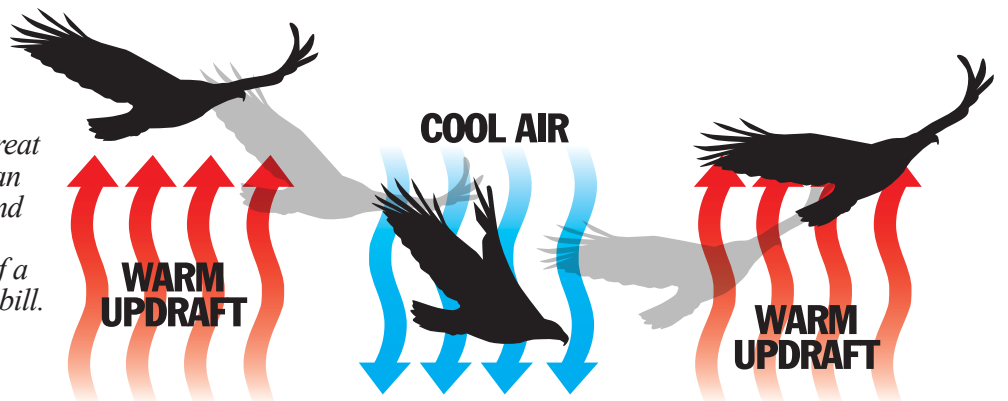
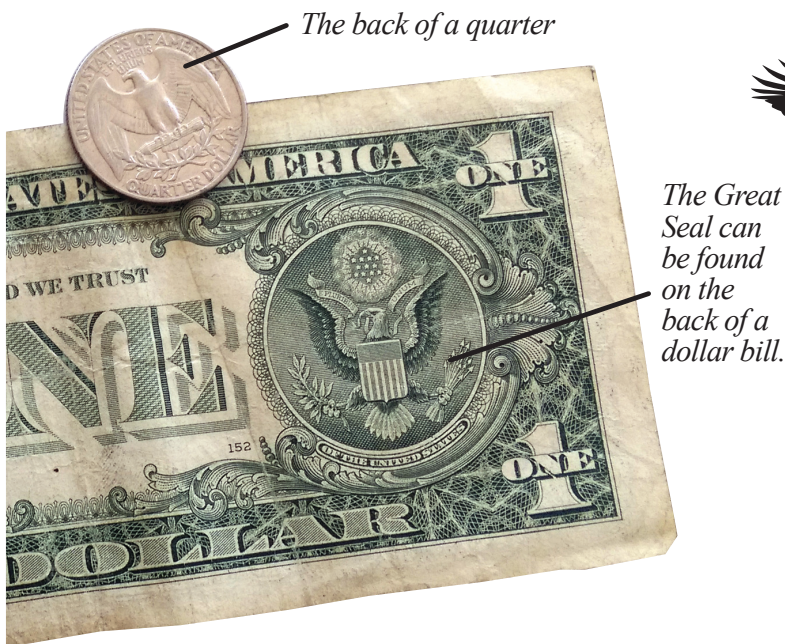
### On eagle's wings

### Eagles everywhere

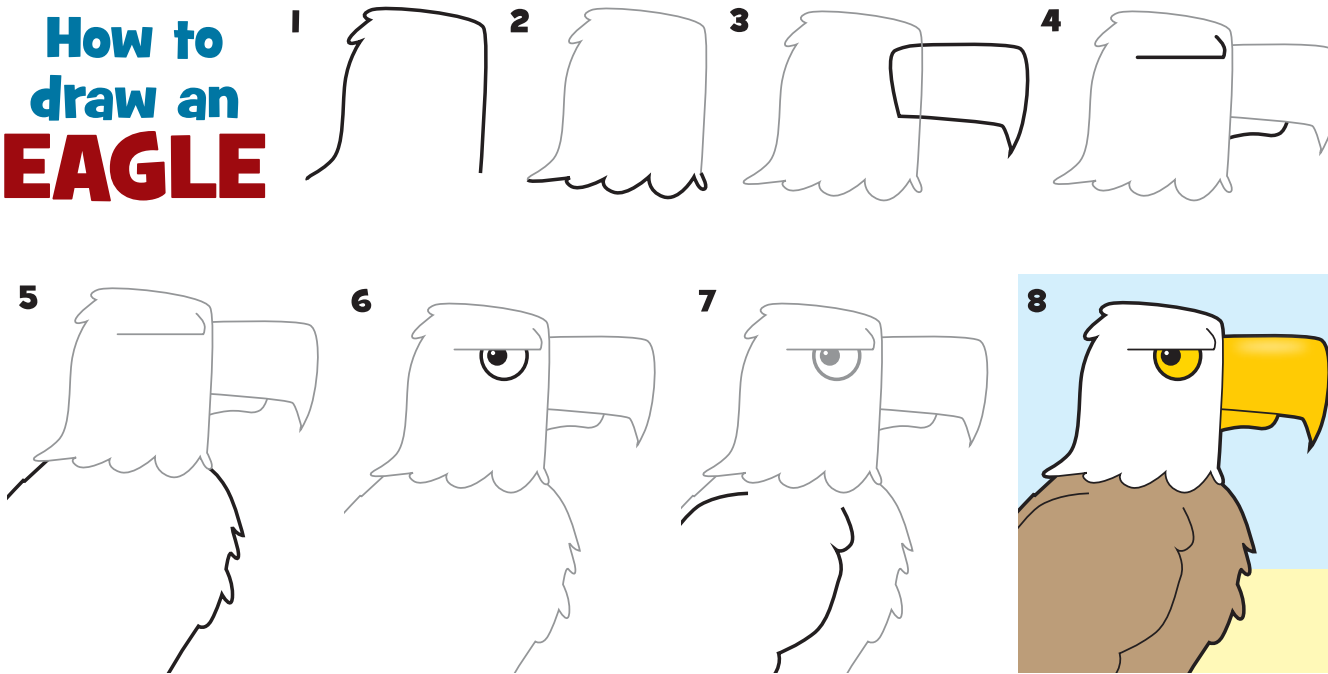
The bald eagle can be found on the Great Seal of the United States, on the country's money and in many images of patriotism. This week, look around you and see how many times you see pictures of a bald eagle.



A bald eagle's long, broad wings make them good at soaring through the air. On long flights, eagles rarely flap their wings. Instead, they use thermal updrafts. Thermal updrafts are currents of warm air that rise up from the ground. Eagles save energy by flying high in a thermal updraft and then gliding down to catch the next one.

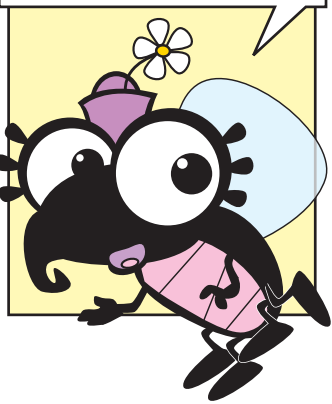
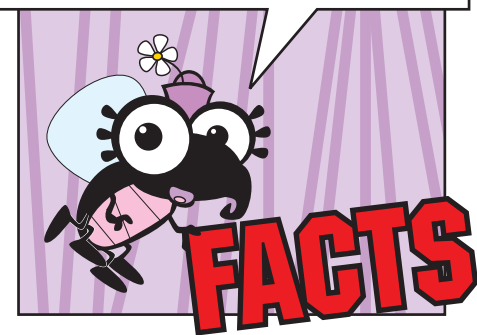


## Nellie Fly on THE FACTS

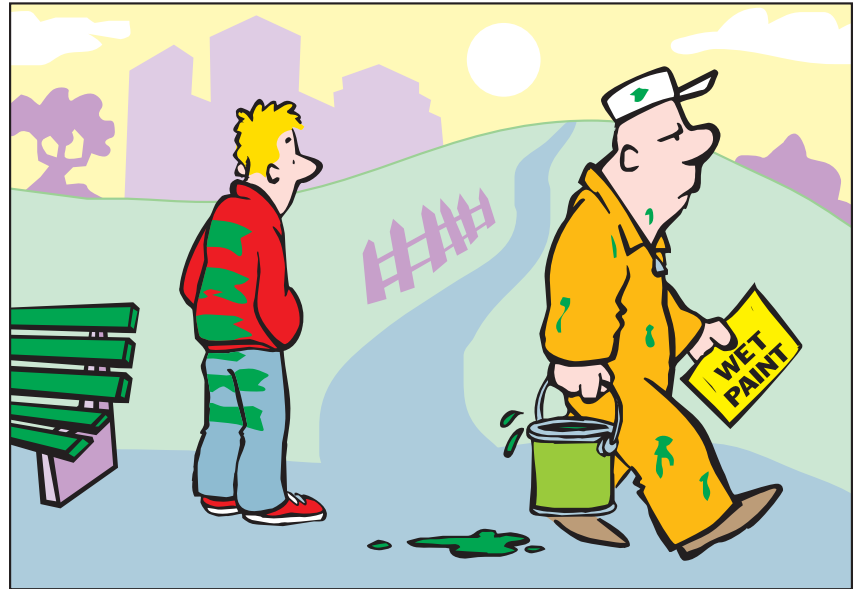

# FLEA LEAPS TO VICTORY

BUGTON – The Annual Bugton Jumping Competition was held yesterday at Swampy Shores Arena. Once again, Festus Flea out-jumped all insect contestants and set a new long distance record.



Festus Flea

"Festus is unbeatable," said second-place finisher Edwina J. Grasshopper. "I'm not sure anyone in the world can jump as many of his own body lengths as Festus can."

Flea jumped an amazing 13 inches, which is more than 200

times the length of his own body. He leaped entirely out of the stadium and onto the back of a passing greyhound. Officials said he did not return for the awards ceremony following the competition.

The competition was not without some controversy. Katy Pillar transformed into a butterfly during her initial jump and was disqualified, which bugged a lot of the 50,000 fans in attendance.

This is the 33rd year of the competition, which attracts insects from distant meadows. Contestants leap on a yardstick to measure their distance, and are scored based on their size.

# Does a curve ball really curve?



People used to think curve balls were just an illusion. But thanks to technology and the

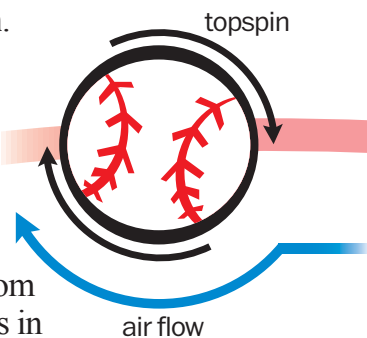
science of physics, we now know that a baseball actually does curve, as much as 18 inches, when thrown by a skilled pitcher.

## Curve balls: forces and motion!

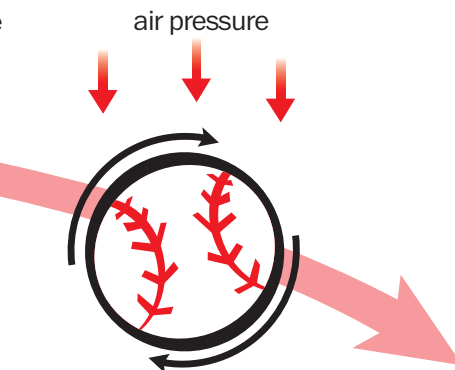
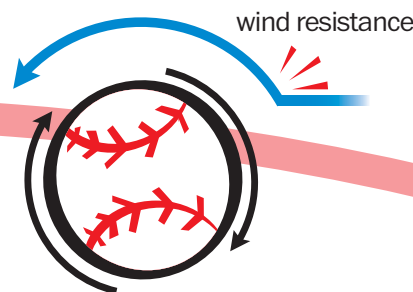
Curve balls start when a pitcher throws them with **topspin**.



As the ball spins, its bottom surface moves in the same direction in which the air moves.



Topspin makes the top of the baseball spin in the opposite direction to the air moving over the ball's surface, creating **wind resistance**.



Wind resistance creates higher **air pressure** above the ball which pushes against the ball, making it fly in a curved flight path.

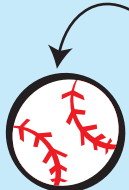

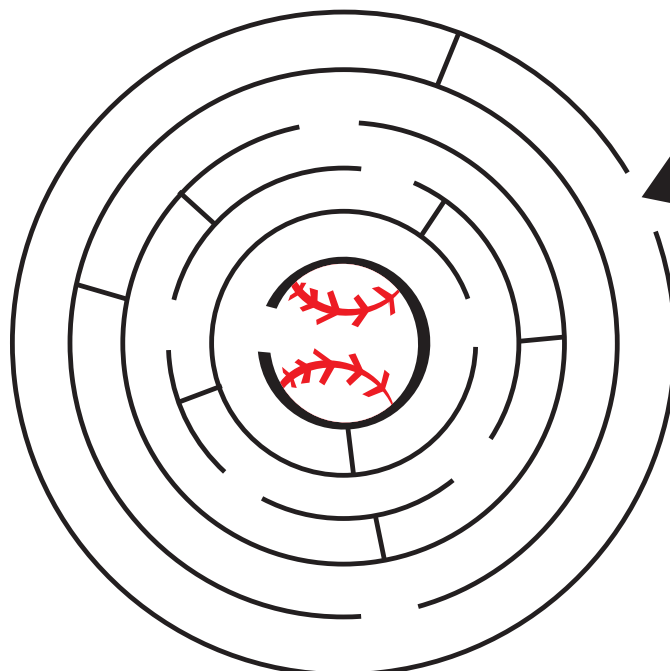
